"Time to Decide"

"I Racing of Long Island...A Really Cool Day at the Race Track"

Without really going there

"Better bring a seatbelt!"

I just went through one of the coolest experiences any car guy could have, I drove an F1 car. That's right.. Formula One!

O.K. your right, no F1 car owner would ever allow me even close to one of those cars. But I did the next best thing; I got as close to driving a real F1 car as any of us ever will. Not only did I have this great experience but I had your editor Mr. Peter "Andreti" Giordano racing there right alongside me!

Allow me to explain, right here on LI - in Hauppauge, just off of Motor Parkway, is the **I Racing Center of Long Island.**



What is **I Racing?** It's a group of four race car simulators. Real race car simulators. It's only been around for two years and started as a teaching school for race drivers to improve their driving skills. Pete and I showed them just how much teaching they needed to do. Ferrari racer, and instructor Artie Weiner runs the simulators and instructs wannabe drivers [like Pete and me] as well as serious completive racers.



Allow me to let Artie explain, "We started as a teaching school for race drivers but we are now open to the public, to give anyone a chance to learn to race or just spend some time in a car to feel what it's like to drive at competitive speeds. We have four simulators that can also be linked up together so you can race four drivers at the same time! We can display 30 real tracks and 25 different cars.

All the cars can be set up for individual personal racing. You can pick and adjust tire pressure, gear ratios, wing settings, and any and all mechanical changes. This can be done to any one of the cars, including settings for the color of the car and the number on the side."



Eventuality "Mario" Giordano and I had to be physically removed from the seats of our race car simulators. This, is **really, really, cool!!** You just don't want to stop. You can drive a Mazda, or an Indy car, a Ford GT4, Mustang GT500, a C6 Corvette, a Formula Ford, even a Cadillac CTSV.

Artie says "We also provide scheduled and non-scheduled races of up to eighteen cars at a time! We are linked by computer all over the world so you can race other drivers in the United states or Europe. You can learn to drive at Daytona, Road Atlanta, Watkins Glen, Road America, Laguna Seca, and that list continues with twenty four other race tracks." Have I mentioned that this is **really cool stuff?**



You can have a personal professional instructor or just practice yourself. You sit in a real seat, with a real steering wheel, and there is a paddle shifter just the same as Formula cars have, including clutch, brake, and gas pedals! A lap time clock and a tachometer, as well as a miles per hour indicator all serve to help you improve your racing skills.



I Racing is open by appointment any day, and any time that is convenient for you. I would have paid more for the experience if I had to, but I Racing only cost \$40.00 for one hour. You can also set up a complete race with three of your friends that includes practicing, qualifying, and a 15 lap race at the track of your choosing. Trophies are awarded for the winners and runner up.

You can also have corporate or birthday parties, club meetings, or any other event you can imaging! Go yourself or take some friends, it's **really really cool.** Call Artie, you will love it...516-984-4868

My Car Story

In the spring of 1977, I was looking to purchase an older convertible to use as a commuter car from my apartment in Fresh Meadows, Queens to my work in Astoria, Queens. A short search of the newspaper turned up a 1968 Plymouth Barracuda Formula S Convertible with a 340/automatic combo. Seemed to be the perfect work car. For a mere \$500 (remember this was 1977) it was mine!

The car's color combo is Forrest Green Metallic with white stripes and a black top. It has "gills" between the wheel wells which look really cool! It sports a black bucket seat interior with an auto shift in the console and Rally Pack dash. Power top, power steering and power disc brakes round out the car's equipment options.



The Barracuda seemed to have a troubled existence as something was always going wrong with it, and my wife made fun of it because her '69 Charger could easily walk away from it at any stop light drag. However, being able to drop the top when the time seemed right was a wonderful thing. In 1978 we bought a house and as the troubled car it was, it died the day we closed on the house! We had to push it into the garage where is slept peacefully for quite a few years.



I got the 'Cuda up and running in the 80's and ultimately did a resto-mod a little at a time. First off I added Cragar wheels and BF Goodrich T/A's. Then I installed a new 360 cubic inch crate motor in '92, bodywork and paint in '96 and so forth. Pretty much over time, every wire, tube and assembly has been replaced or rebuilt.

Down the road, I was unhappy with the handling and added frame connectors, increased the diameter of the front sway bar and added a rear sway bar. The '68 Barracuda now handles the road considerably better, these were some of the best changes I made to the car!

The Barracuda now handles the road considerably better, one of the best things I did to the car. At this point the Barracuda is reliable and comfortable to drive anywhere. Outside of rebuilding the original 340 engine one day, this car will pretty much stay the way it is now.



While stripping the dash down, I stumbled on the warranty card with the original owners name and this led to speaking with the early owners!

Owner #1 received the car as a high school graduation gift. He Rally raced the car from time to time during his tenure. Owner #2 used it as his daily transportation and occasional racer at the drags. #3 was a high school student as was Owner #4. Then it was my turn. I am #5 and (unless Pete Giordano finally succeeds in buying this car from me,) it will be passed down in my family!





During the resto, I sent VIN tracings to Galen Govier (1996) who told me there were only 14 documented '68 Formula S Automatic Barracuda Convertibles as of that writing. One website sent to me by a friend stated 336 '68 Formula S 340 Auto Convertibles were built.

No matter what the actual production number may be, it seems to be pretty rare!

Who would have thought that what started as a \$500 beater for work would be a rare classic one day! Back then muscle cars we cheap and plentiful.



A mere 36 years later and it would take a lot for me to part with the "old car". It's noisy, smelly, handles and brakes awful and I love it.

Just perfect!!
